“Hong Kong’s ‘One Country-Two Systems’ Framework: resistance, retrogression and resurgence?”

Abstract: The lecture examines the first twenty years of Hong Kong’s ‘One Country-Two Systems’ framework. The reasons for its failure are examined in the context of increasing pressure from mainland China and resistance of the civil society and critical questions about its relevance for Taiwan are discussed. Particular emphasis is laid on the rise of new political actors in Hong Kong and the political awakening of the young generation.

“Is the China Model replicable?”

Abstract: This lecture begins with the context of an academic discussion of the China Model and explains what the China Model is. It proceeds to unpack the China Model into specific components which cover economic, political and social dimensions to examine to what extent Chinese experiences can be shared with other nations. We use the case of the Belt and Road Initiative as a vantage point to observe how the China Model is generating an impact on the rest of the world.

Dr Malte Philipp Kaeding is a Lecturer (Assistant Professor) in International Politics at the University of Surrey, UK. His research covers international politics and includes topics such as identity and social movements, elections and democratisation with a regional focus on East Asia and particularly the so-called 'Greater China area' with China, Macau, Hong Kong and Taiwan. He received his PhD from Hong Kong Baptist University and Magister from Heidelberg University.

Dr Heidi Wang-Kaeding is an Assistant Professor of Asian Politics in the Department of Political Science at Trinity College Dublin with an appointment at the Trinity Centre for Asian Studies. Her research investigates how domestic interest groups influence Chinese foreign relations, with a substantive focus on environmental issues. She received Ph.D. in International Relations from London School of Economics (LSE) in 2017, MSc in Politics and Communication from LSE in 2012, and Bachelor of Social Sciences from Hong Kong Baptist University.
